Responsibility

Mr. Williams first started teaching in 1959 in Billings, Montana. He graduated from Eastern Montana College. He holds an M.A. degree from Stanford University.

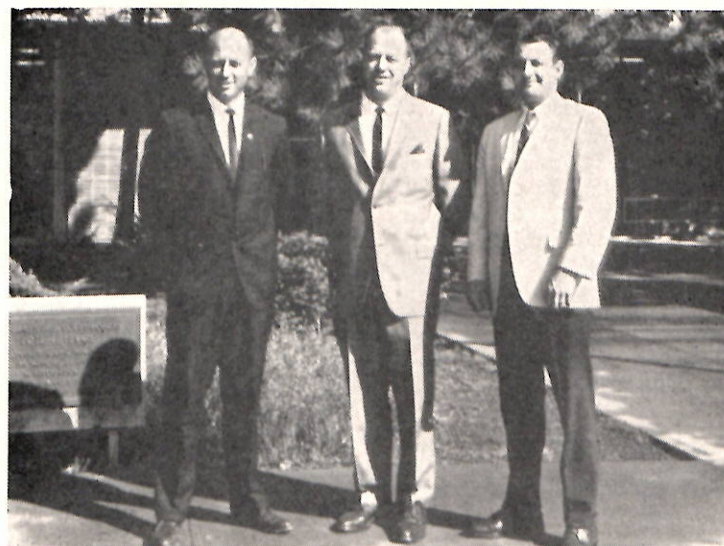
Mr. Anderson thinks Ferris' potential is unlimited and "if students take advantage of it, they can receive the finest education in the United States."

Seminar Program

Dr. Ed A. Olson, Whitwors, Eric Johnston Science Center, and Dr. Howard Stien, Whitworth, Research Concerning Immunological Reactions will be the featured speakers tomorrow at first session of the Saturday Science Seminar and Research Program.

This program, sponsored by District 81, continues throughout the school year and is open to any interested student enrolled in a District high school. Ferris is the host school. Saturday sessions begin at 9:30 a.m. in Room 304.

Mr. Al Finley, director, the program is designed to further motivate and assist those students who are scientifically inclined toward independent study.

"As now planned, specialists in various fields will be employed to bring the participants up to date on the latest developments in their fields," Mr. Finley said.

Saturday's session will consist mainly of orientation procedures, with subsequent sessions devoted to topics of general interest to the group.

Exeter Rated First Class

The Exeter, Ferris' yearbook, was awarded a first class rating in the 47th All American Yearbook Critical Service of the National Scholastic Press Association. More than 1,000 student yearbooks from high schools all over the nation were judged by the NSPA in groups divided by enrollment.

Entries in the NSPA Critical Service are judged in all areas of production from content through photography, writing and layout.

Three Seniors Qualify In Scholarship Tests

Three Ferris High School students are semi-finalists in two major National Scholarship testing programs.

The students, all seniors, are Roebin Smith, John Snyder and Tim Wisecarver.

Roebin Smith was one of 37,000 Negro students participating in

the fourth National Achievement Scholarship Program. This number has been cut down to 3,000 students who are listed as Commended Candidates and recommended to the colleges as "deserving of admissions consideration by even our best colleges."

Roebin entered the competition

with students from all across the nation as a junior in hopes of becoming one of the 1,000 students that will be chosen as finalists and eligible for the Achievement Scholarships. These four-year scholarships range in value from \$1000 at \$250 per year to \$6,000 at \$1,500 per year depending on the student's need.

On November 16 the names of the finalists of the National Achievement Scholarship Tests will be announced.

John Snyder and Tim Wisecarver are taking part in the National Merit Scholarship Testing Program.

The choice of participating in the Merit Program is a decision left up to the school and the students. Many students feel that if their grades are not good enough that there is no way to participate in the competition. This is not true. The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is to find out students of exceptional intellectual promise and accomplishments, because the Merit Program concentrates on the individual performance of the student.

Ferris' attendance this year is 1921, its largest so far, with 451 Freshmen, 506 sophomores, 513 juniors and 451 seniors.

One of the most interesting talks was "Women in Politics," given by Mrs. Marjorie Lynch.

When not involved in politics, the girls were kept busy with many activities. There was a band for the girls who played instruments and a large choir. One evening a talent show was presented by the girls themselves.

Carol Hastings said it was impossible to get to know everyone, but the spirit among the girls was "just wonderful."

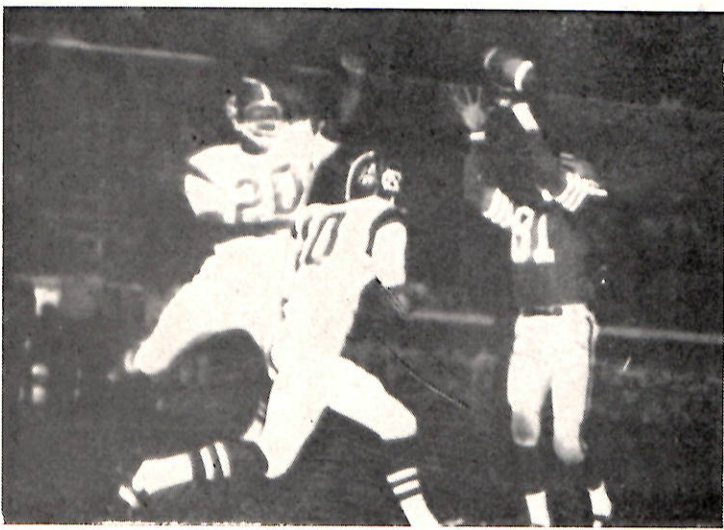
